Composing the Cover

This composition aims to capture naturally occurring events and activities on Draper Pedestrian Block. I used mixed media including conte crayons, washes of sanguine, and India ink with brush drawing.

The perspective is distorted to include more than the natural eye can see. The street sides are warped to showcase what one might experience on a casual stroll along the eclectic shops, cafes, along with the music from the piano under the tents.

Sketching, drawing and photographing in the streets on random days and nights provided inspiration for content. Bicyclists, skateboarders, musicians, students, public yoga practitioners... a great intermingling of people.

All sandwiched between Coffeeholic's and Bollos with public tables and benches, this block is our representation of Cafe Culture.

Café culture is a historic and worldwide tradition based in and around coffee shops which have always been a gathering place for those interested in intellectual discussion and engaging conversation which is fertile ground for artistic and creative exercise.

I see Draper Block as interactive; a place of incubation, inspiration, and collaboration.



In Remembrance Joe Kelley

I first met Joe while working as an Assistant for local artist Ray Kass. We discovered a shared love of rockabilly music and he gave me a recording of his band playing on WUVT's The Local Zone.

He was Ray's right hand man, and I was more of a helper with the larger traveling shows to galleries and museums in Richmond and NYC. We would hang up and/or take down shows and sometimes spend a week or two at Ray's loft in Spanish Harlem, sleeping on futons or sleeping bags.

After I discovered that the barrelhouse-sized Hispanic-Afro-Haitian-Cuban after-hours club a block away had \$3 Corona and a band of drum players and dancers around a juke-box, Joe had to come to get me one night when I lost track of time. I remember his glasses and relaxed smile across the dark bodega-sized bar, him politely cutting through the crowded and sweaty room and grinning and with no judgment saying in his unique drawl: "Hart, I think it best we go home." We laughed about it walking the block back in the hot city summer early morning.

I went to pick up some of his art work and visit him a few times in his house off of Ellett Road on the side of a ridge which was often only accessible by foot and not accessible at all if the creek had flooded the bridge.


The last time I saw Joe was one rainy afternoon when he came to my house to take apart a 1926 Cincinnatus Piano that's playing days were done. The sounds from the stringed harp during disassembly was amazingly creepy. The rain had stopped when he closed the door to his truck bed, us resting our forearms on opposite sides of the bed, surveying with approval the assorted hammers, keys, legs, face-board and mantle. The 300lb stringed harp leaning against a big oak behind us in my backyard like a musical lawn ornament. He eventually used the salvaged parts for art pieces he exhibited at his new home, and in museums and art galleries. The sun was setting and I remember him taking a deep breadth and a pause, him saying: "Well I best get home." Miss you Joe --HF

Stella's Story

Sweet tea, soft supple hands, and the most comforting lap to sit on when sad; Cornbread, paddy cake, and teaching me arithmetic. These are just some core memories that I have of my grandmother, Stella Rose Mullins Cranwell. My favorite memory of her was when we drove below the low-hanging branches of our favorite willow tree while blithely getting her black sedan stuck in the mud. To me she was Gran; but to the town of Blacksburg Virginia, she was something else, something equally as supportive, admirable, and dignified.

Stella Rose Mullins, born in 1935 to Maxie and William Mullins, grew up with her eleven older siblings in Richlands, Virginia. At a young age, Stella developed Scarlet Fever. As a treatment, she and her family moved to Ft. Pierce, FL to be in the sun and sea air, where her father continued his lucrative Lumber Mill Company. In Stella's teens, she found herself back in Richlands, VA where she rekindled her relationships with Mary Ellen and William C. Cranwell, two siblings from another family in the area. Stella and Mary Ellen were best friends and soon became sister-in-laws when Stella and William tied the knot. Becoming Stella Cranwell was one of her greatest joys in life. She was so proud of her family. She and William had three children; William C. Cranwell II, Corliss M., and Jane Ellen. She loved Williams's older daughter Kitty Branch like her own and adored her four Grandchildren: Corliss Cranwell, William C. Cranwell III, Sydney, Nicole, and Kasey. Stella and Mary Ellen Deemer stayed best friends until passing away only weeks apart.

Stella passed away in 2010 but left behind her kind and gentle touch all over the town of Blacksburg VA. Stella was a lover of the arts and gracefully participated in philanthropy throughout her entire life. Stella was a member of the Baptist church, homeroom mother for all three of her children, and was known for hosting gatherings in support of the community and Virginia Tech. Stella was also on the town's beautification board and pushed for the arts throughout Blacksburg. She and William eventually donated the home where they raised their three children to Virginia Tech (The Cranwell International Center). Stella could make anyone feel at home in her presence, from governors to gardeners, she was gracious to all. I believe that is why she put so much of her love into the Town of Blacksburg, to make it a home and not simply a municipality.





Basic Rules on Foraging

In Search of Yarrow

A friend is building a farm just outside town on a few rolling acres beneath the ridge of Brush Mountain. Her husband is making a serious go at vegetable farming, and she is committed to giving a loving home to otherwise unwanted animals with a menagerie of horses, cats, and a sweet Jack Russel mix.

What catches my eye is that much of the land is left uncultivated with wild-flowers. I am looking for a robust patch of wild yarrow. Yarrow, or *Achillea Millefolium*, is named for Achilles who, legend has it, used the wildflower for first aid to staunch bleeding in wounds, which is only one of yarrow's many medicinal uses.

Unfortunately, my usual foraging spot had been mowed and I didn't want to take the few plants I found growing there. *Unless it's an aggressive, invasive species, collect only a small amount from a healthy, robust patch.*

I see an ocean of white blooms and go to the edge of the field for a closer look, as Queen Anne's Lace, another knee-high, white, flat-topped wildflower is also blooming this time of year. But this plant, with her sturdy stalk and tell-tale feathery leaves is definitely yarrow. **Know the lookalikes.**

Back at my friends' place, I explain that I make salves and teas with yarrow and ask if she minds if I collect some. Ask permission. Get the okay not only from any land-stewards involved, but, for those of us spiritually-minded, ask the plant's permission, a piece of advice given by some indigenous foragers.

I carry a pair of safety scissors in my purse or car just for such occasions and was able to collect a nice bouquet of fragrant yarrow that I took home to dry a bit before infusing in oil.






Lab Reports

Summer Sipping Suggestionsby Cassandra Kessman of Blackburg Wine Lab

This summer my husband's new hobby is using our new smoker and grilling. While it is nice to not have to cook dinner, it can take hours to smoke it. In the meantime, I have a few ideas to sip on while we wait. Let's explore summer wines that pair perfectly with porch sipping, pool sitting and sizzling steaks, grilled veggies or seafood. These wines have a few elements in common-light in body, crisp with a solid acidic backbone, sometimes spritzy, sometimes still and chilled. I want to go out on a limb and suggest interesting bottles that aren't your typical varietals of Sauvignon Blanc or Pinot Grigio.

#1. Vinho Verde – Vinho Verde is a style of wine from Portugal in the Minho region. Verde means green and it is best to enjoy this wine young. They are known for their spritzy bubbles, zippy acidity, citrus notes and are also low abv (Alcohol by Volume) which is perfect for a hot summer day. It pairs well with salad, fish tacos, beaches, porches, picnics and patience while you continue to wait for the grill master. It also is made as a rosé! My favorites are the Quinta da Raza Vinho Verde & Arca Nova Vinho Verde Rosé.

#2. Vermentino – This is perfect for poolside sipping. Vermentino is predominantly grown on the Island of Sardinia in Italy. You will be transported to the island on your first sip. If you are a Sauvignon Blanc fan you will love this! It has the acidic back bone that all New Zealand Sauv Blanc fans love. It is a complex wine with notes of lime, grapefruit, green apple, and a hint of white flowers. My favorite is the Argiolas Costamolino Vermentino from Sardinia, Italy.

#3. Muscadet – Muscadet hails from the Loire Valley in France. This wine is named after the region it comes from. The name of the grape is called Melon de Bourgogne. Confusing right? Why is the grape named after Burgundy when it comes from the Loire Valley? It's said that the grape originated in Burgundy. This wine is perfect with any seafood! Oysters on the half shell, mussels, white flaky fish, and seafood boils – the epitome of summer with friends!. My favorites are Domaine de la Pepiere Clisson & La Perdrix de l'annee des Betes Curieuses Muscadet.

Finally, the grill master has finished dinner, time to sit down and pour us a glass of one of these summer bottles. The hardest part is deciding which one to pop open...



Creative Process of Piano Painting

My creative process and collaboration of ideas with the Downtown Piano Committee began with the arrival of a donated piano from the Blacksburg Pentecostal Holiness Church replacing the old one on Draper Road.

The broad idea for the imagery to be placed on the piano focuses on the democratization of music by the Boombox and incorporating local art patrons to honor Stella Rose Mullins Cranwell and Danny and Johnson of the Greenhouse in Blacksburg. The Boombox is also is a tribute to local Blacksburg artist Joey Paleukas' mural for the 16 Blocks and Town of Blacksburg mural program Untagging the Town.

Stella Rose's family was instrumental in the production of a half dozen downtown murals on the exterior walls of the downtown properties including the three at the Farmer's Market. Greenhouse owners Danny and Lee Johnson worked with the city of Blacksburg to design and build the town skatepark. I am truly inspired by these endeavors to give people a place to express themselves.

I installed and stretched a blank canvas on the back of the piano. I used an old-school projector to transfer the image of a retro boombox. The Boombox adds to the musicality of the acoustic piano, creating a transcendental experience when the piano is played as if the music is emerging from painted speakers.

I used a combination of oil and spray paint to Upcycle this interactive art piece. "Stella Rose", hand painted in cursive metallic script and rose designs were painted on the front and skateboards on the sides. I added the 16 Blocks Magazine logo with a hand-painted working QR code on the top to encourage players to reach out to the magazine to share their experience.

A member of the Downtown Piano Committee added a small plaque with a quote by the musician Roy Ayers. 'The true beauty of music is that it connects people." Ayers continued, saying,"[Music] carries a message, and we, the musicians, are the messengers."

This piano has been creatively revamped and is an interactive art exhibit accessible to all. I hope this is just the beginning of more public art works I hope to bring to the Blocks.


PARIS POLSENO-HENSLEY: "I'm sad to see the growing licenses go immediately to multistate corporations"

The Alexander Black House is the name and former home of the founder of Blacksburg. He drew the original town charter for 16 downtown blocks in 1798, much of which is still visible from the second story window. Black was known for having a mint julep on the front porch rocking chair after his workday and waving welcome to his neighbors in the community to join him in the gloam of the Appalachian evening.

16 Blocks Magazine was founded upon that principle of open conversation and celebration, a homegrown and free publication and creator of public artworks and events for locals and visitors alike.

In the CosmoLocal sense, 16 Blocks is a metaphorical microcosm meaning the interconnectedness of neighbors and travelers from all walks of life along with those who came before, allied in a shared community experience and celebration of our time, our place.





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Larry Bechtel Works in Progress

The celebrated and prolific Blacksburg sculptor opened the gates to his wife Anne's garden and the door to his studio for a tour of finished and unfinished sculptures. Bechtel was recently commissioned by the City of Roanoke to make a larger than life-size monument to replace a Robert E. Lee statue with one of Henrietta Lacks.

He also recently completed a commissioned sculpture of John DeVoy for the American Heritage Museum in Albany, New York and his new piece *Transformations* is taking great shape in his backyard studio.

Transformations In His Words

I'm working on it now so its in process. I like it out here because I get the sun in the morning which makes the clay real soft, and I can manipulate the clay better with my hands.

It is actually based on an Irish folk tale. There was a poet named Angus who was the God of Poetry. He searched the world for his lost beloved, whose name was Caer, and discovered that she was entrapped in a magic lake and was a swan among many, many other swans.

So in order to identify her, Angus turned himself into a swan, and they saw each other, and they recognized each other, and the two of them then flew up out of the lake as swans. They re-assumed human form as they did and that is the basis of this piece.



EM: Can you share some tips for readers who want to enhance their personal style on a budget?


Hoge: Definitely pick staple pieces that you can mix and match to wear with everything, a good pair of jeans and a solid colored shirt can go a long way.




